

Will it be Fritz again?

CAN THE NORTH HOLD OFF THE SOUTH IN THE "C" DIVISION?

Ah, yes! With the return of the Minuteman Classic, I once again get to practice the fine art of predicting who the winners will be. While never easy, and I'm never one toot my own horn, if you go back to my 1992 predictions, you will see that I correctly predicted the Recreational Division finals as well as the medal finish of Old Friends from St. Louis in the Women's Division. The competitive division is always easy — predict Fritz — and more than likely, you'll be right.

This year, I'm not so sure I can repeat on a clean sweep as 1995's crop of teams are relatively new to the tournament, at least in the "C" Division.

In the Competitive Division, as I previously mentioned, Fritz would have to be considered the pre-tournament favorite. Even though they have lost some key players from last year's team, they remain unbeaten as of June 19 and, if they are to be chal-


lenged, more than likely it will come out of Philadelphia. namely the Bike Stop team. In tournament play, this team has given Fritz fits, knocking them into the loser's bracket at the 1994 Gay Softball World Series in Nashville, and in April of this year, pulling another upset of Fritz in the Birmingham tournament. The remaining teams in the division include the Ramrod, the Fenway Falcons and the New York Splash Sharks. You can expect these teams to be evenly matched and very competitive. The prediction here, though, is that Fritz and the Bike Shop should finish first and second. The third spot is wide open.

In the "C" Division, expect Philadelphia to field some strong teams. They will, however, face heavy competition from the Boston teams, including Randolph Country Club, the Fritz Southenders and Yukon. The wild card teams are from the South: the Ft. Lauderdale Stud, Norfolk's The Other Side and the Tampa Cove Pilots.

This is the first year of the "C" Division in the Minuteman Classic, so it's hard to make a prediction as to who the top three will be. However, not being one to shy away from a controversy, I'm going to go out on a limb and say that one of the southern teams will finish in the top three and the other two spots will go to Philadelphia and Boston teams.

Now that I have set myself up for easy criticism, those feel stubbed can prove me wrong by winning. Good luck to all!



History Beantown

t began as a thought, be came a reality and was the driving force behind the Beantown Softball league's attempt and culmination of the 1991 Gay Softball World series.

According to local softball historians, Gary Staples and Leslie Tiffany were the original thought provokers. In the early years of the Tournament (1983-84), it consisted of only one division and games were played at Daisy and Cleveland Circle Fields. It wasn't until the games were moved to the fields in Cambridge that the Classic became a bonafide, two division tournament.

The Boston Ramrod won the Competitive Division by beating Fritz on a Joe Peltier home run or misplayed fly ball depending on who you talk to. In the Recreational Division, the 1270 won its third title by beating back a challenge from the Ploughboys and Mirabar of Providence. The banquet was held at the Cyclorama, complete with mouthwatering lobsters.

In 1988, the Tournament was moved to Smiths Field on Soldiers' Field Road where the permanent home for the Classic has been found, more or less. That year, one of the most unforgettable games, ever in the history of the Tournament occurred. The Annex Reds team, ranked nationally at that time, won the Competitive Division over Charlie's Niners from New York, beating them in the "if necessary" game of the double elimination tournament. However, it was the first game of the championship between these two teams that remain strong in many Classic's fans' minds.

The never say die Charlie's Niners came back from an 11 run deficit in the bottom of the last inning to force the "if" game. The Niners became the crowd's favorite following the comeback that year and each year after. Oddly enough, the Boston Competitive teams all took a quick exit from the tournament.

In the Recreational Division, the Fritz Raiders stormed through a crowded field beating the perennial Rec. Division powerhouse, the 1270. It later proved to be the end of what had been a 1270 stronghold on the BSL's Recreational Division. It was also the first year of the Women's Division in the Tournament with Chicago's Synergy winning what would be two championships in a row. Off the field, Commissioner Bob Burnham lost his voice and then. yours truly, a newcomer to the scene, did the talking and they haven't shut me up since.

In 1989, the Tournament became one of the largest in the country with some 33 teams participating. The Tournament grew in status as well as quality as nationally ranked teams came to Boston to take on a newly-formed Fritz team and the local Metro Boston Amateur Softball Umpires joined the umpiring crew, thus a working relationship between the BSL and the ASA began.

In the Competitive, Fritz proved to live up to its early season billing by beating back a challenge from the Norfolk Outlaws and an upstart Luxor team. The Boston Mets, sponsored by the Metropolitan Health Club, surprised many by winning the extremely competitive recreational division. They became known as the "Comeback Kids" by rallying to defeat the Raiders and Mirabar, then fought back in the "if" game to beat the Philadelphia Key West team. This match-up re-occurred in 1990 when the two teams later known as the Ramrod and Blue Parrot, would showdown in the championship game of the National Invitational Tournament at the Gay Softball World Series in Pittsburgh. The Parrot won the rematch. In the Women's Division Synergy won the division beating Leslie Tiffany's team.

Off the field, and not to be forgotten, was the case of the missing bat as the Boston Mets went to bat against the Mirabar, just another strange occurrence in the life of

gay softball. The banquet became a buffet and was held at the Villa Victoria, and for the first time, trophies were given out after the games at the fields.

In 1990, as Boston began preparations for hosting Series '91, 28 teams came to Beantown for a sneak peek of what was to come. Fritz won its second consecutive championship in the Competitive Division beating out Charlies Niners from New York. The Niners had upset the Norfolk Outlaws earlier in the tournament.

In the recreational, Maximum Security exploded to win the championship by beating the Southenders in the title game. In the Women's Division, Indigo won its second Classic championship. The banquet was held at Buddies with Congressman Barney Frank making a special appearance.

After hosting the 1991 Gay Softball World Series and Hurricane Bob, the Beantown Softball League wearily hosted the Minuteman classic once again in 1992.

While the tournament was smaller in size than in previous years, 25 teams participated and the games themselves provided plenty of excitement despite some foul weather - rain and cold for the first two days of the tournament. In the Competitive Division, Club Cafe and the Ramrod got the tournament off on the right foot as Club Cafe hung on to post a thrilling victory. The win proved to be a catalyst for Club Cafe as they went on to finish in second place, upsetting the Minnesota Bandits who finished third.

Winning the division of course, was none other than our own Fritz team, who later in the year would win the 1992 Gay Softball World Series in Los Angeles.

In the Recreational Division, pre-tournament predictions proved true as Chaps, Fritz Falcons and Carl's Raiders of Los Angeles battled it out to the end for the championship.

While the Falcons came in third, they came together as a team and when it came to the finals, Chaps and Carl's Raiders provided the fans with a thrilling two game championship.

The Raiders came out of the loser's bracket and handed Chaps its first loss and then in the "if necessary" game, had everyone on the edge of their seats as they and Chaps battled back and forth before Chaps won it in extra innings, thereby keeping the Recreational Division in the history of the Minuteman Classic.

In the Women's Division, Indigo, otherwise known as the old 1270 team, posted another championship and B Serious came in second. Old Friends from St. Louis came in third in their first trek to Boston.

Now, after a two year absence, the Minuteman Classic returns and you can bet that no matter who wins, there will be some memorable moments on and off the field, as well as some of the most exciting games of the season.

Open daily at noon, this South End neighborhood favorite boasts one of Boston's most famous Sunday Brunches (only \$9.95). This Sunday, July 2, the Minuteman Blockbuster Street Dance happens from 5:00 to 8:00 p.m. right outside the door on Chandler Street. Host: Bill Svetz.

One block north, near the corner of Berkeley St. & Columbus Ave. is CLUB CAFE, offering great new music and comedy videos in its MOON-SHINE lounge Saturday night with VJ Tom Yazbek. No cover. Piano entertainment in the Lounge all weekend long. Sunday Brunch: \$9.95. This popular gay/lesbian restaurant and lounge proves that casual elegance doesn't have to be stuffy. Host: Frank Ribaudo.

Go two blocks south of Fritz and enter THE **EAGLE** (520 Tremont St.), another South End neighborhood hotspot

with the accent on Levis, Dockers and a no-attitude, down-to-earth friendliness that is definitely catching on. Not to be outdone by other clubs, an all-you-can-eat Sunday brunch can be found here, too, for the same \$9.95. Open daily at 4:00. Live DJ most nights. Host: Leo Moises.

In nearby Bay Village, there are three separate venues all under one roof at (69 Church St.): MARIO'S restaurant; the sports video bar, JOX and music video cruise bar upstairs, LUXOR. The lounges open at 4:30 p.m., with the dining room open at 5:30. Here, you're apt to meet that hot, young college jock, as well as president of the local bank and just about every male Bostonian in between. All credit cards accepted. Host: Brian Gokey.

Ready for a live version of Priscilla, Queen of the Desert? Right around the corner from Luxor is JACQUES, (79 Broadway) one of the nation's foremost Female Impersonation Shows seven nights a week at 10:30 and home of The Mess in a Dress, The Bitch of Boston: Sylvia Sidney (Tuesdays). A small cover charge is your ticket to A World of Fem-tertainment and frequent live musical entertainment as well. Host: Don Richards.

The oldest and most elegant "bar for gentlemen" in Boston is NAPO-LEON (52 Piedmont St.), also in Bay Village behind an unobtrusive red door and hidden to all but those who know it - a throwback to the days when being gay had to be a secret. Nattily-attired bartenders, crystal chandeliers, spotlessly clean surroundings, Renaissance paintings and statuary create an ambiance found only in Boston's most exclusive private men's clubs. Live piano music most anytime. Dancing on weekupstairs JOSEPHÍNE'S Host: Billy May.

Head a few blocks west to Copley Square and find CHAPS (27 Huntington St.), a half-blocklong store-front gay megaplex behind two-way glass. (You can see out, but you can't see in!) There is no sign to announce Boston's only (and hottest) seven-nights-a-week dance club, open from 1:00 p.m. till 2:00 a.m. Three bars, music videos, go-go boys, Sunday splash dance at 6:00. Cover after 9:00 p.m. Host: Brian Kelley.

A brief cab or subway ride (Orange Line on the "T" to Haymarket Sta-

tion) will bring you to the famed Boston Garden area where there are more Irish pubs per square foot than almost anywhere on the planet but only one gay bar, 119 MERRIMAC. Its name is its address so, again, don't look for a fancy sign (or even a window). This funky hotspot is the only one left in the North End of Boston, since Sporters closed recently after 38 years, as did Bobby's after four. The city's gay population has mostly migrated to the South End and Back Bay, so most of its clubs have too. But this mighty leather and Levi landmark hangs on proudly, with a friendly and very cruisy clientele. Open daily at noon. Pool tables. DJ on weekends. No cover. Hosts: Steve &

Russell.

Hop over, jaunt, sashay or whatever, but make it a point to get to "The Fenway" - not the Park, the three gay cha-cha palaces that surround it. Speaking of famous Fenway Park, a walk up three flights of stairs to the roofdeck of QUEST (1270 Boylston St.) on Monday or Saturday nights gets you an almost perfect view of the home of the Red Sox, and all the action when our beloved Sox are playing at home. For even more fun, take in the three other floors of dancing and entertainment action. Many bars, go-go boys, drag queens, contests, special promotions, freebees, frequent BBQs.Co-hosts: Michael Svat & John Dellarocco.

Two doors (and a world) away

is THE RAMROD, Boston's nationally famous leather and Levi bar bringing together fantasy, fetishes and the reality of the serious S&M aficionados and those who like them. Open daily at 4:00 p.m. (with a terrific complimentary buffet Sundays at 8:00). DJ dancing Thursday through Sunday. Uniforms, leather accessories encouraged but not necessary. Host: Jeff Zerpoli.

Just around the corner at 15 Lansdowne St. is the "Sunday night place to be" for over 1,000 Mr. Rights, AVALON, a 15-year dancing tradition on Boston's biggest dance floor with the most famous light and laser show in the East. The Generation X crowd is alive and well and likes the dancing hot after 10:00. Co-hosts:




